Milestones and Awards

2023

April

- First Microvascular Penile Replantation Surgery at CMC Vellore.
- The second centre in the country to conduct Cardiac Radiosurgery.
- Inauguration of drug-resistant tuberculosis laboratory.

August

- CMC Vellore, Ranipet Campus, was awarded as one of the best hospitals in Tamil Nadu for its performance excellence in the Deceased Donor Programme during 2022-2023.

October

- ICMR-Collaborating Centre of Excellence (ICMR-CCoE) recognition for the following:
 - The Department of Pulmonary Medicine for TB research.
 - The Department of Microbiology for translation research in clinical infectious disease, laboratory diagnostics and antimicrobials.
 - The Wellcome Trust Research Laboratory for soil-transmitted helminths and other parasitic NTDs.

July

- A first in the country - the Brainlab ExacTrac-Frameless Stereotactic Irradiation features real-time monitoring with thermal and surface guidance technology.
- First anniversary of the 'Da Vinci' robot and completion of 250 robotic procedures.
- Inauguration of the Center for Guideline Development.

September

- The Department of Trauma Surgery completed its first-ever Advanced Trauma Life Support (ATLS) Provider Course.

The inaugural ATLS Provider Course, held from 31st August to 2nd September 2023, raised the bar for trauma care standards and reinforced CMC Vellore's reputation as a leader in medical education and training.

November

- The Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology & Family Welfare received a Shield and Certificate of Appreciation from the Department of Health & Family Welfare, Tamil Nadu State.

This recognition was for achieving the maximum number of sterilisations among voluntary organisations.

2024

February

- The new Mammography Machine-Hologic 3 Dimensions system is designed to provide radiologists with higher-quality 3D images.

Patients benefit from a more comfortable mammography experience, while technologists enjoy improved workflow efficiency.

October

- The Department of Biomedical Engineering (BME) received accreditation from NABL for calibrating Mechanical parameters (Speed, Acceleration) and Thermal parameters (Temperature) - the first of its kind in the country.

December

- The Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation's (PMR) Prosthetic and Orthotic Services (P&O), with the support of the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), collaborated with the Wheelchair Basketball Federation of India (WBFI) to conduct a wheelchair basketball training programme, to observe International Day of Persons with Disabilities.

March

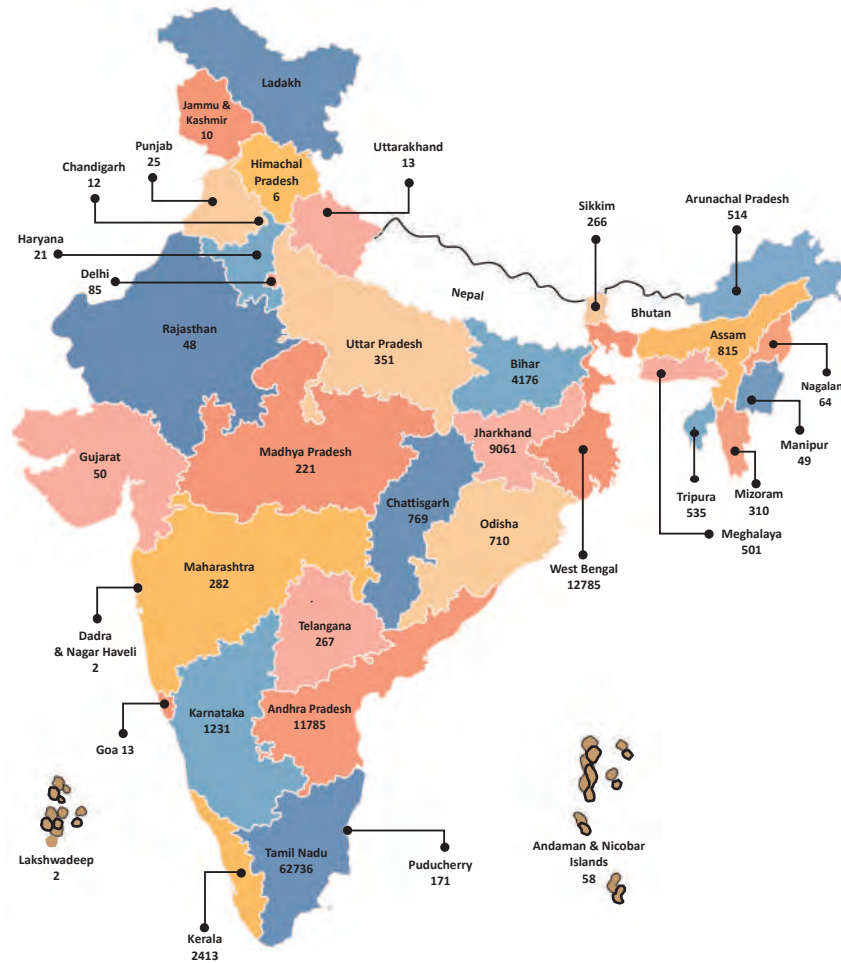
- CMC Vellore has procured the Hyperfine Swoop low-field portable MRI scanner - the first hospital in the country to have this state-of-the-art equipment.

The Hyperfine Swoop scanner produces a magnetic field of only 0.064 T, making it safer and more energy-efficient than traditional MRI machines.

CMC Vellore reintroduced the Chief Minister's Comprehensive Health Insurance Scheme Tamil Nadu (CMCHISTN), alongside the Nammai Kakkum 48 (NK 48) Scheme, offering coverage for all road accident victims within Tamil Nadu's borders, including tourists and foreigners. Furthermore, the hospital has launched the Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (ABPMJAY), extending the Central Government Health Insurance Scheme to all states in India.

Winter Symposium

The Winter Symposium addressed the critical themes of Antimicrobial Resistance, Vector-Borne Diseases, and Zoonoses. The event facilitated discussions focused on tackling these urgent global health challenges.

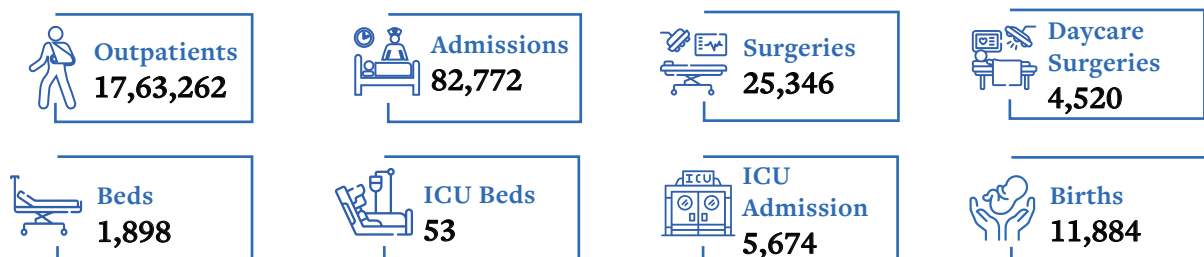

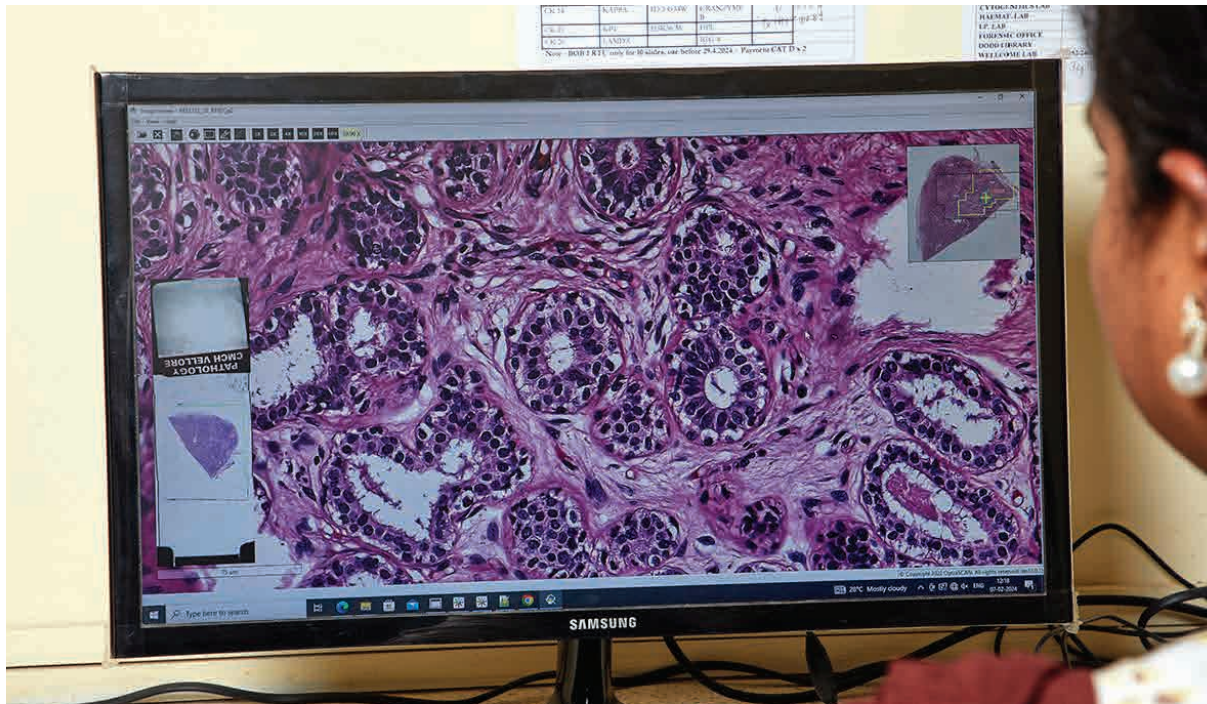

Digital Pathology



Digital Pathology, an advancement in diagnostic practices, involves the scanning of entire glass slides to generate high-resolution digital images. The Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) approval for primary diagnosis in 2017 marked a significant milestone. Embracing this technology, the Department of Pathology adopted it in July 2023.

Its implementation brings numerous benefits



Enhanced Consultation

Facilitates cross-campus consultations, particularly for rapid intra-operative diagnosis and emergency surgeries.



Workflow Optimisation

Contributes to improved workflow, addressing workforce challenges and enhancing the overall quality of service.



Remote Consultation and Expert Collaboration

Allows remote image access for immediate global expert opinions, improving the quality of reporting.



Efficiency and Elimination of Backlog

Digitisation streamlines workflow, reduces backlog, and optimises diagnostic resources, improving turnaround time.



Education and Training

Supports improved training for students and professionals through virtual study sets, teleconferencing, and collaborative tumour board discussions.



Archival Benefits

Preserves image quality for easy retrieval, reducing costs associated with re-cutting, staining, and storage.



Research Collaboration

Facilitates resource pooling and collaboration, enhancing research efforts and promoting interdisciplinary cooperation.

CMC Poisons Information Centre (CMC PIC)

The CMC Poisons Information Centre (CMC PIC) runs a vital 24/7 toll-free hotline to enhance patient care for poisoning and envenomation cases across India. Offering diagnostic guidance, antidote information, and referral advice, CMC PIC supports doctors in managing patients effectively, with most calls originating from rural areas. CMC PIC also responds to chemical incidents, conducts educational programmes on chemical safety and snakebite prevention, and advocates for policies to reduce poisoning and snakebite burdens. Working closely with the Clinical Toxicology Unit, CMC-PIC provides care for acute and chronic poisoning cases in outpatient and inpatient settings. The centre hosted a meeting for snakebite survivors at CMC Vellore on 9th February 2023, with 18 participants.

Seams of hope



Elumalai survived a venomous snake bite that nearly took his life. After traditional remedies failed, the family rushed him to CMC Vellore for urgent medical care.

He had a stormy clinical course, requiring plasma exchange and dialysis for kidney failure. He faced various complications, including a cardiac arrest.

After 71 days, including 57 days in the ICU, he returned home to a tearful reunion with his family. “I thought I lost him,” recalled his wife, and “It’s a miracle,” shared one of his sisters, grateful for the care and concession her brother received. Now, he shares his story with his neighbours and teaches them about snakebite first aid.

CMC PIC community outreach activities

During 2023-2024, CMC PIC conducted 199 awareness sessions, reaching 3,999 participants. Three awareness sessions were held for 63 CMC Fire safety workers, and an online session was organised for 30 participants from Trichy Post Office.

The outreach efforts included visits to 10 villages, where 13 sessions were conducted, engaging 1,486 participants. Two sessions were conducted in 2 industries, with 75 participants, while five schools and colleges received eight sessions, benefitting 2,030 students and teachers.

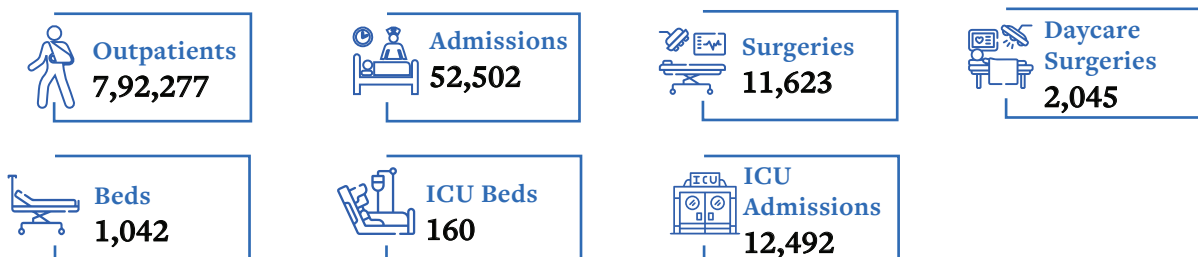


A liver transplant in progress

| Brachytherapy

Brachytherapy is an advanced form of radiation therapy designed to target and treat localised cancerous tumours. It involves placing radiation-emitting seeds, ribbons, or capsules directly into the tumour or the surrounding affected area. Commonly used for cancers of the head and neck, breast, cervix, prostate, and ocular, this technique delivers high doses of radiation to the tumour while minimising exposure to normal tissues.

Three types of Brachytherapy are available: Low-dose rate (LDR) implants, High-dose rate (HDR) implants and Permanent implants. CMC Vellore has a High Dose rate Remote after-loaded Iridium 192 Brachytherapy. Brachytherapy is commonly used for curative therapy for cervical cancers.

Brachytherapy, a treatment for cervical cancer, typically involves the use of a small tube known as a catheter, although, at times, a larger device called an applicator is utilised. CMC has multiple types of applicators that can treat all stages of cervical cancer with Brachytherapy. The Brachytherapy suite at the Ranipet Campus has a dedicated theatre, recovery area, CT simulator, and treatment console designed for a seamless patient-centric workflow.

TAVI - Transcatheter Aortic Valve Implantation

In 2016, CMC Vellore launched a Transcatheter Valve Replacement programme. The Cardiology Department performs nearly 75 Percutaneous Valve Implantations annually. Our low-cost TAVI programme has benefited patients nationwide and internationally.

In 2018, we established a dedicated cardiac valve and structural heart disease clinic.

CMC Vellore is the first medical college in India to perform percutaneous valve replacements for all four heart valves: aortic, mitral, tricuspid, and pulmonary, driving our commitment to medical excellence.



Pulses of Hope:

SK's journey to recovery with TAVI

In his 80s, SK from Gaya, Bihar, enjoyed working in his field and spending time with his grandchildren. His vibrant life was interrupted by dizziness and fatigue, leading to a diagnosis of a heart valve condition.

In 2023, SK and his family travelled to CMC Vellore. We explained that the TAVI/TAVR technique could replace the diseased heart valve through a small cut in the leg, avoiding open-heart surgery. The TAVI procedure was successful. The next day, SK was ambulant, and he was discharged after two days of observation.

A month after the TAVI procedure, he was back on his feet, juggling work, farming, and chasing after his grandchildren. At his six-month check-up, he shared, "I'm feeling more energetic with each passing week, and it's great not to be out of breath all the time."

Echocardiography showed normal heart and aortic valve function, with good blood parameters. SK is thankful to CMC Vellore for giving him a new lease on life.



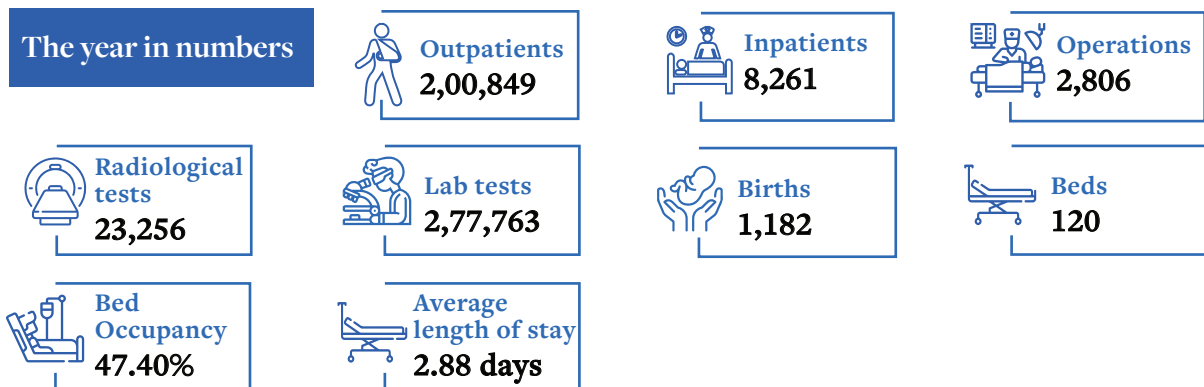
Chittoor Campus

Chatram (The Shelter)

Established in 1906, Chatram, situated only 400 meters from CMC's town campus, offers low-cost accommodation for patients from faraway places, charging less than US\$1 per day.

Chatram residents begin their day with a wholesome breakfast, thanks to the contribution from the MBBS batch 1970. With additional support from other donors, we provide lunch or dinner, averaging 30-35 meals daily.

In 2023-2024, we accommodated 302 residents from 10 states. Residents receive weekly visits from a chaplain affiliated with CMC, and a full-time caretaker resides on the premises to attend to their needs.



My second home

“After a freak bike accident landed me at CMC, I’ve undergone four surgeries since 2020 to mend my injured hand and legs. Chatram feels like my second home now. It’s hard to describe the overwhelming warmth and care I receive here, especially from Ravidas and Saradadevi, who are residents at Chatram. I lost my mother at a young age, and soon after, my father left me. I’ve only my grandfather in our village, who cares for me. Ravidas and Saradadevi go above and beyond, even sharing their meals with me. My heart is truly touched,” shares Venkat, who still faces four more surgeries.

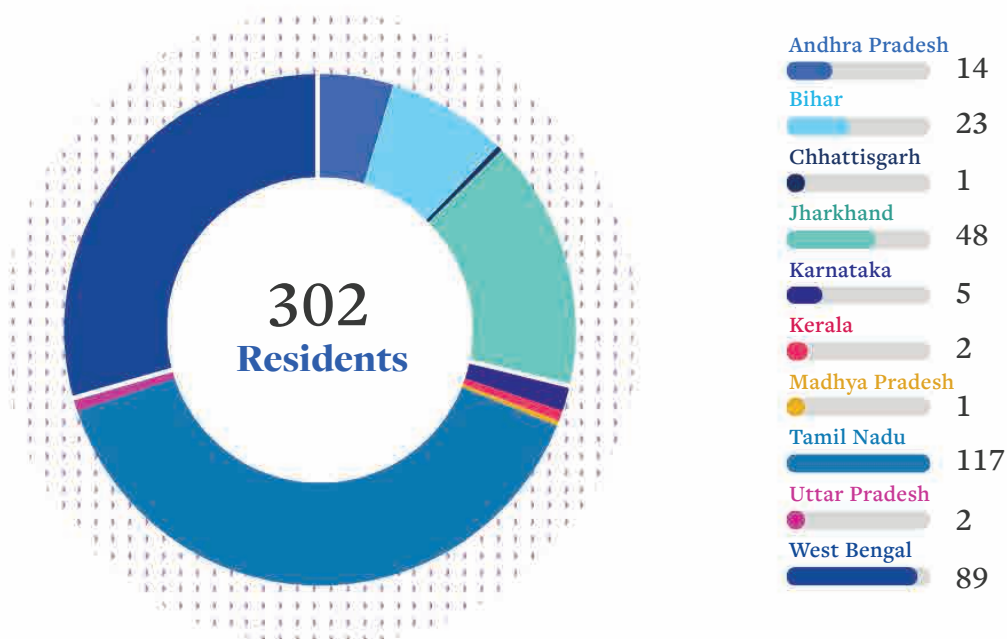
For the past five years, Rekha has regularly visited Chatram for treatment in various departments, including Rheumatology, Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, and Orthopaedics. “The doctors are my saviours,” she says with gratitude.

“Rekha was an active girl up to the age of 13,” recalls her father, who has stood faithfully by her side at Chatram alongside her sister. “She fell once and couldn’t get up. Despite visiting numerous hospitals in Kolkata, only CMC healed her,” he continues. Her sister adds proudly, “Despite all these challenges, Rekha has completed her BA.”

Rekha shared, “We somehow cover the rent and even receive free breakfast. So, our expenses aren’t too much. After that, we feel calm and peaceful, like everything will be okay.”

Pastoral Care

Biogas Plant

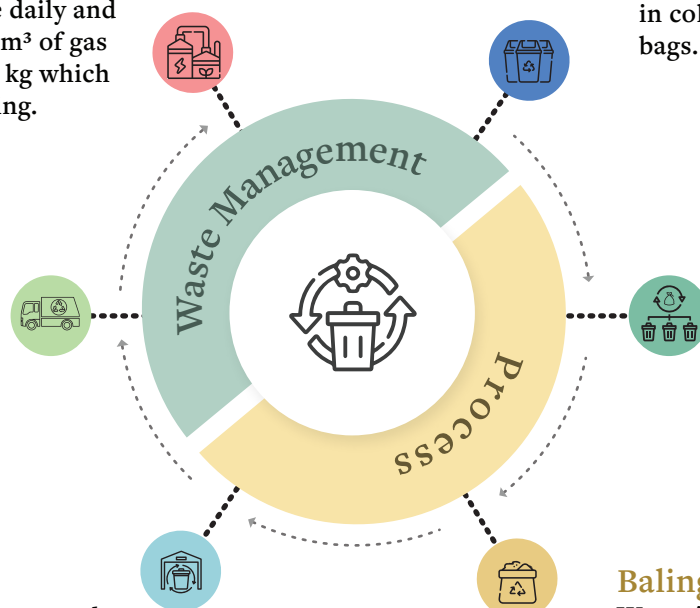
The plant handles up to 3000 kg of waste daily and generates 20-25 m³ of gas from every 1000 kg which is used for cooking.

Dr. Mary Verghese, a pioneer in Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation in India, founded the Rehabilitation Institute in Bagayam in 1966. Additionally, Dr. Suranjan Bhattacharji was instrumental in launching the Spinal Cord Injury (SCI) Mela in 1994 and the Brain Injury Mela in 2004.

Rehab Mela 2024

Our Rehab Melas transcend mere gatherings; they reflect hope, resilience, and each person's potential. Here's the insight of our Rehab Mela.

Annual PMR Team Events: Brain Injury and SCI Melas 2024

Two significant events occurred in February: the 21st Brain Injury Mela on February 10th and the 31st SCI Mela from February 16th to 18th. A total of 75 individuals with Acquired Brain Injury (ABI) and 240 with Spinal Cord Injury (SCI) actively participated in these events. The medical team conducted thorough assessments, encompassing blood tests, ultrasound, cystoscopy, and CMGs. Additionally, the psychiatry team offered assessments and devised interventions for addressing neuro-behavioural challenges post-brain injury. Participants gained valuable guidance from a diverse range of professionals.

Empowerment and Festivities

People with spinal cord injuries and their families enjoyed cultural activities, including entertaining competitions like drawing rangoli and witnessing thrilling wheelchair basketball matches. They also received guidance on accessing financial support for entrepreneurial endeavours. SCI alumni displayed their talents, while participants benefited from counselling sessions, health education, and additional engaging competitions. The event ended with a special cultural show by the Rehab Family.

Fast- forwarding life

Palani reflects on his journey, remembering his admission to CMC in 1995 with uncertainty about his future. “I remember my state when I got admitted to CMC in 1995. I didn’t think I’d make it,” he shares emotionally. Fast-forward to 2024, he is married, a parent of two children, and a successful business owner. Overwhelmed with gratitude, he thanks CMC for his life’s transformation, offering blessings to all involved.

Palani had a spinal cord injury. He was in our care for nine months and then transferred to the Rehabilitation department for rehabilitation. “I was here for more than seven months. I had no movement. I didn’t want to live. I thought there was no future. What can I achieve in my state? But the staff had other plans for me. When nothing was possible, CMC assured me that it was possible. Since then, it’s been a new chapter. When I was young, I always dreamt of running a business. You helped me expand my dreams,” he says, with a tinkle of pride.

Empowering people like Palani, who face mobility challenges, enables them to get employment opportunities and build networks that offer support and guidance. They also find renewed freedom and independence, gain respect and dignity, and can pursue their dreams.



Mental Health Centre



The Department of Psychiatry offers comprehensive care for people with mental and emotional challenges, providing both inpatient and outpatient services.

A multidisciplinary team of professionals offer diverse forms of psychiatric treatment, such as medication, electroconvulsive therapy, and psychosocial interventions.

Alumni Spotlight

Christian Medical College Vellore proudly presents Dr. Stanley Cecil Macaden with the Paul Harrison Award for 2023, honouring his exceptional and selfless dedication to establishing and advancing palliative care services in our country.

The Paul Harrison Award was initiated in 1966 by CMC Vellore to honour medical graduates or post-graduates for their outstanding and selfless contributions to healthcare.

Dr. Stanley Cecil Macaden now joins this esteemed cohort.

Dr. Macaden joined CMC Vellore in 1963 for his undergraduate medical studies. Following his service obligation at the Jalna Mission Hospital, Maharashtra, Dr. Macaden was trained in the UK, obtaining the MRCP in 1977.



Devoting three decades to Bangalore Baptist Hospital (BBH), he served as a consultant physician and held administrative roles, notably CEO/ Director. Under Dr. Macaden's leadership, BBH focused on improving patient care and training standards, aligning itself with top tertiary centres. The tripartite agreement between BBH, CMC Vellore, and the International Mission Board was a significant achievement.

A pioneer for palliative care in India, Dr. Macaden initiated the programme at BBH in 1995. Trained at prestigious institutions like the International School of Cancer Care and Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Centre, USA, he established a comprehensive palliative care programme at BBH. This programme, adapted to the Indian context, included Home Care Services and transformed BBH into a Regional Training Centre for Palliative Care.

Dr. Macaden made significant national contributions to palliative care, shaping protocols and training programmes. He was the Clinical Lead for 'Project India' with the International Collaborative for Best Care for the Dying Person and the Past Secretary and National Faculty for the Indian Association of Palliative Care (IAPC). As the National Coordinator for Palliative Care projects of the CMAI, he educated and trained healthcare professionals nationwide, initiating palliative care services in multiple mission hospitals. As President of Sanman, a citizen volunteer group in Bengaluru, he supports existing palliative care organisations, patients, and families. He advocates for quality palliative care, aiming for its mandatory provision in all hospitals across India.

Even in retirement, Dr. Macaden actively promotes Palliative Care, highlighting its role in preserving dignity for patients nearing the end of life. Inspired by figures like Dame Cicely Saunders, he aims to integrate compassionate care into medical practice.

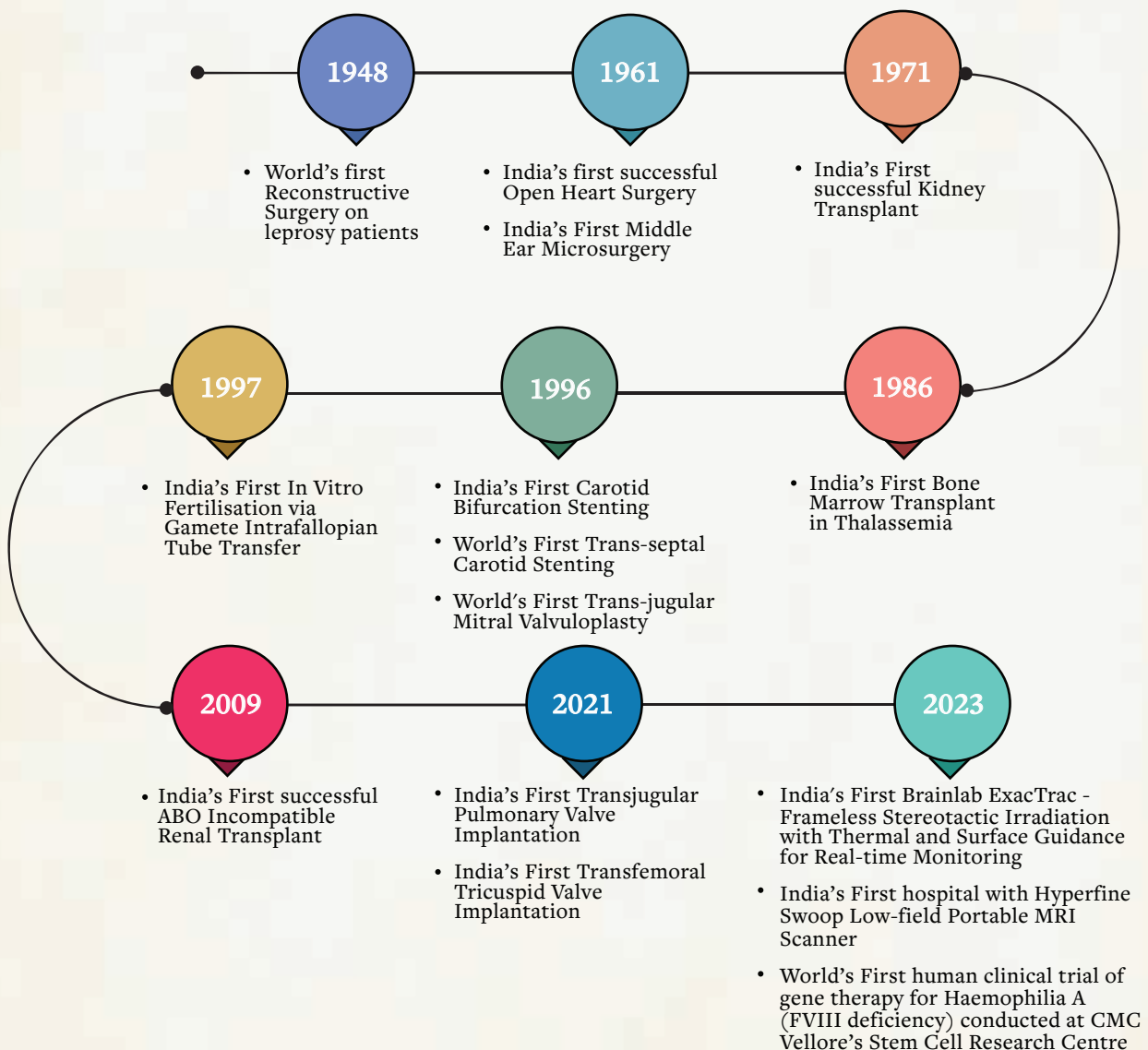
Hearts and Hands:

100 years of healing at CMC Vellore Town Campus

As we celebrate 100 years of the Town Campus, the story of the famous three knocks still lingers in our ears. CMC Vellore's founder, Ida Sophia Scudder, was inspired by three desperate knocks on her door, seeking help for women in critical need. This profound experience led her to start a single-bed dispensary that became the Christian Medical College Vellore, dedicated to providing compassionate healthcare to those most in need.

On December 19, 1923, the first hospital building was inaugurated on the Town Campus – a single-storey outpatient dispensary. Services started in 1924, after the hustle and bustle of Christmas. The surgical beds moved to a new ward built above the Cole Dispensary, named after the supporters of the hospital building programme. By 1928, the hospital on the town site had 140 beds in four blocks, four outpatient clinics, and two operation theatres. Over the years, it has grown into a world-renowned hospital, emerging as a leader in healthcare, both in India and globally, touching countless lives along the way.

Nursing Education



The history of nursing education traces back to 1909 when CMC Vellore pioneered the Lower Grade Nursing Course for girls, followed by the opening of India's first College of Nursing in 1946. Since then, nursing education has been seamlessly integrated with hard work, ensuring superior patient care and comprehensive theoretical and practical learning experiences.

In 2004, the College of Nursing was designated as a WHO collaborating centre for Nursing and Midwifery Development, one of two such centres in India. It has also received a prestigious five-star rating from the National Assessment and Accreditation Council of the University Grants Commission and serves as a study centre for the national Ph.D. consortium. The College of Nursing was granted the 'Nursing Excellence' certification by the National Accreditation Board for Hospitals and Healthcare Providers (NABH) in November 2017.

We nurture a culture of inquiry, providing faculty and students with research skills and promoting their active participation in healthcare research across all levels.

CAR-T Cell Therapy



CAR-T Cell Therapy is an advanced cancer treatment where a patient's T cells are genetically modified to attack cancer cells that have become resistant to chemotherapy. This treatment is effective but extremely expensive (Rs. 3-4 crore per treatment) and logistically challenging, especially with centralised manufacturing.

A more feasible alternative is to produce CAR-T cells at the point of care. Academic or tertiary care centres can achieve this using an automated device called the CliniMACS Prodigy. At CMC Vellore, researchers tested the safety and feasibility of this decentralised approach to producing CAR-T cells for treating B-cell leukaemia and lymphoma.

First Gene Therapy Trial for Haemophilia A conducted at CMC Vellore

The first clinical trial of gene therapy for Haemophilia A (FVIII deficiency) took place in India at Christian Medical College Vellore, in collaboration with the Department of Biotechnology, the Centre for Stem Cell Research - a unit of InStem Bengaluru, and Emory University, USA. Dr. Jitendra Singh, Union Minister of Science & Technology, announced this milestone during the "National Science Day 2024" event on 28th February 2024 at Vigyan Bhavan.

Annual Research Day

The 13th Annual Research Day took place at the Bagayam Campus on 12th and 13th October 2023. It served as a platform to celebrate and showcase the incredible depth and breadth of research endeavours by faculty and students across various fields, including Medical Specialties, Surgical Specialties, Nursing, Allied Health Sciences, Fieldwork and Epidemiology, Bioengineering, and several PhD programmes. Over two days, we witnessed an impressive total of 354 poster presentations and 257 podium presentations.



Outreach

Department of Community Health



Established in 1955, the Community Health and Development Programme (CHAD) is the epicentre of CMC Vellore’s community health initiatives. It comprises a training centre, outpatient clinic, and secondary care hospital, providing training opportunities to medical, nursing, and paramedical students, postgraduates, and staff. Renowned worldwide for its epidemiological and translational research, it operates as a hub for medical excellence.

CHAD provides essential medical services, occupational therapy, health education, and nutritional guidance to rural communities in the Kaniyambadi block and tribal hamlets of the Jawadhi hills.

Partnering with the Tamil Nadu Government under the Tamil Nadu Health Systems Project, we conduct mobile clinics six days a week, with 73 clinic spots in 180 villages.

Other programmes under our outreach services are community-based rehabilitation, cancer screening and Thalassemia screening (a new initiative). The community development programmes include the model village initiated in four villages, with access to sanitation, potable water, education, livelihood, and healthcare (all through subsidy), and other programmes for children (50 evening study centres with 1300 children), scholarship, substance abuse and animal husbandry and integrated agriculture.

Rural Unit for Health and Social Affairs (RUHSA)



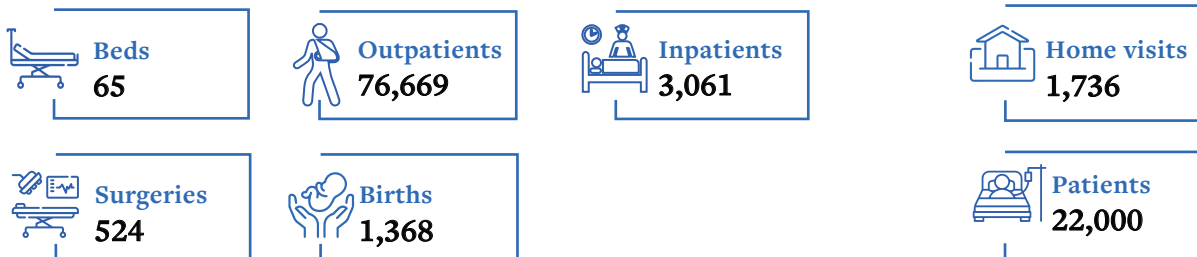
Established in 1944, RUHSA, located 25 kilometers from Vellore, provides primary healthcare, inpatient care, mobile health services, and vocational training.

It also promotes income-generating projects and improves agricultural practices.

RUHSA Hospital

The hospital serves as a central and peripheral unit for nearby areas. The peripheral unit covers K.V. Kuppam block, serving 1,38,000 people across 18 units, 25 periphery centres, 39 panchayats, and 107 villages.

Doctor-led clinic

In 2023, RUHSA conducted 304 clinics, identifying 22,454 persons with various morbidities. We provide health education on diabetic diet, foot care, maternal and child health (MCH) consultations, and medications. At Devarishikuppam Panchayat, our monthly doctor-led clinic provides affordable healthcare to its 6,500 residents. Among them, 45 patients, including three antenatal mothers, received support, while four were referred to RUSHA Hospital.



Pachaikili Children’s Play Centre



At the Pachaikili Children’s Play Centre, children spin happy magic. Nine-year-old Mohan enthusiastically jumps up from his seat to answer a teacher’s question. Mohan is one of over 20 students who learn and play there.

We create a joyful learning environment with caring teachers and a helper. This centre helps kids shine in every way—from their bodies, minds, and emotions to their creativity. We educate parents to monitor their child’s growth and address nutrition issues through regular check-ups. Our annual picnic promotes fun and friendship, while our nutritious meal plans, guided by a nutritionist, ensure everyone stays healthy with daily milk and eggs.

Elderly programme

RUHSA’s elderly care in the K.V. Kuppam block provides healthy ageing through diverse service models. Our models are recreation-based daycare centres, healthy ageing centres, and services for disadvantaged elders. Each model includes geriatric assessments and income-generating initiatives.

Across seven daycare centres, 110 elderly receive mid-day meals, while one centre caters to 27 members focusing on healthy ageing.



Vocational Training

Since 1996, RUHSA’s Air Conditioning and Refrigeration Course has grown, training graduates for local and international opportunities, notably in the Middle East. In-plant training at CMC Vellore and internships at reputed companies prepare the students for employment. Impressively, 40-60% of them establish their businesses, promoting the course and offering internships to current students. With 1969 students trained, the programme continues to grow, enrolling 14 students in the January 2024 batch.

Low Cost Effective Care Unit & Shalom Family Medicine Centre



The Low Cost Effective Care Unit (LCECU), set up in 1982, addresses the healthcare needs of underprivileged urban communities.

As part of the Family Medicine Department, LCECU provides primary and secondary care to low-income residents. Located at the Schell Campus, it offers outpatient and inpatient services with 48 beds and operates outreach clinics in seven low-income areas of Vellore. LCECU also trains interns and Family Medicine postgraduates and supports primary care research.

Hope in every breath

Vasanthi*, a 21-year-old from the outskirts of Vellore, faced a series of setbacks following her father's death. Her mother, the sole breadwinner, struggled to support the family on a widow's pension.

Their situation was dire when Vasanthi fell gravely ill. She experienced fever, breathlessness, and weight loss, leading to a grim diagnosis: advanced tuberculosis and respiratory failure. "I felt helpless. I thought I would lose Vasanthi," her mother confessed. But Vasanthi received lifesaving treatment at LCECU and CMC Vellore, thanks to a compassionate support network that covered the costs.

Vasanthi's health rebounded with medical care and proper nutrition. As she gradually regained strength, her mother choked up with relief. "It's a miracle to see my daughter healthy again," she said.

The Department of Ophthalmology



The Department of Ophthalmology, one of CMC Vellore's oldest, began in 1900. Named after the donor's wife, it operates within the 40-bed Mary Taber Schell Memorial Hospital for Women and Children. Dr. Pauline Jeffery introduced the Eye and ENT department at Schell Hospital in 1928. By 1938, plans emerged to upgrade the MBBS course and renovate the hospital.

A separate eye section became essential with a growing need for eye care. We established the Schell Eye Hospital in 1941 with 14 beds, utilising the old Schell Hospital's resources.

Outreach services

Dr. Victor Rambo initiated the first mobile eye camp in 1948, recognising the vast number of curable blind people in rural India. He understood that reaching them necessitated a mobile eye hospital. Ever since, eye camps have operated as a routine service, extending vital eye care to remote areas.

“I'm Savitha, a 27-year-old from Kosapet, Vellore district. Since I was a kid, I've been dealing with Riley Day Syndrome and Total Corneal Opacity. I've been getting treatment thanks to CMC Vellore and Schell Eye Hospital! Schooling was a challenge, so I stopped at 8th grade. With my vision problems, reading and using my phone are challenging. But CMC supported me with aids and training! They even taught me how to dye-print clothes. After three skill and computer training sessions, I can confidently take up dye printing and start a small shop for photocopying. I've got my eyes set on it and will go miles. Thanks to CMC, I'm motivated and grateful for all the help!”

College of Nursing Community Health (CONCH)



CONCH, initiated in 1987 by the Community Health Nursing Department, addresses the critical need for healthcare in rural areas. Partnering with local communities and utilising the existing government and private infrastructure resources, CONCH serves 25 villages with a population of 72,000 and a town area of 27,000 residents across two Community Development blocks in the Vellore and Ranipet districts.

Community Orientation Programme

For those living in remote villages, reaching a Public Health Centre or hospital entails long journeys and incurring expenses. Often, they delay seeking medical attention until it becomes an emergency. To address this, first-year nursing students participate in an annual Community Orientation Programme to evaluate villagers' lifestyles and health status. This survey helps us identify gaps in healthcare and start health orientation programmes. It also provides students with first-hand experience to enrich their education.

This year, Diploma nursing students visited two new villages—Ramapuram and Kavarampalayam in Arcot Block. The students assessed the lifestyles and identified healthcare gaps through mapping, observation, and interviews. The village administrative officers welcomed our healthcare initiatives in the new villages - Ayilam Pudur, Ramapuram and Kavarampalayam.

“Ruby’s smile is back. And when she greets you with that warm ‘akka’ (sister in Tamil), you can feel the joy flowing from her. That’s our Ruby for you,” says the CONCH team.

When Ruby Smiles



Ruby lives in the bustling neighbourhood of Kansalpet, Vellore. One of the nurses remembered finding her during a community visit in 2012 when Ruby was struggling with constant fatigue and heart palpitations.

“We quickly started Ruby on medication and iron supplements. Recovered with the treatment, she would always wait for our visits, narrate her challenges, and share her simple joys. But when COVID hit, Ruby stopped taking her medications. When we went back to check on her, she was low on her Hb levels, with severe fatigue and gastritis,” recalled a nurse.

Regular check-ups and support from the CONCH team helped her get back on her feet.

Mission Network



Manipur Crisis Relief—Transporting essential medical and general supplies to Churachandpur Government Medical College and Hospital.

The Missions Department is committed to supporting and sustaining 168 Mission Hospitals operated by Indian Church Missions in remote places nationwide. CMC Vellore's mission network works to deliver quality, ethical and affordable healthcare to the poor and marginalised.

Significant developments in the past year

The Mission Desk - a fast-track facilitation channel, has been expanded to serve patients better. Last year, 350 patients benefited from this initiative.

The Mission Network Research Grant - was introduced in 2023. This grant supports research across mission hospitals, with 24 hospitals selected to participate in eight research programmes.

CMC Connect - is an online missions portal currently under development. It will facilitate the bilateral exchange of knowledge and resources between CMC Vellore and Mission Hospitals.

Manipur Crisis Relief - the Missions Department coordinated with partners such as CIHSR, EMFI, EHA, and CBM to send essential medical and general supplies to the Churachandpur Government Medical College and Hospital.

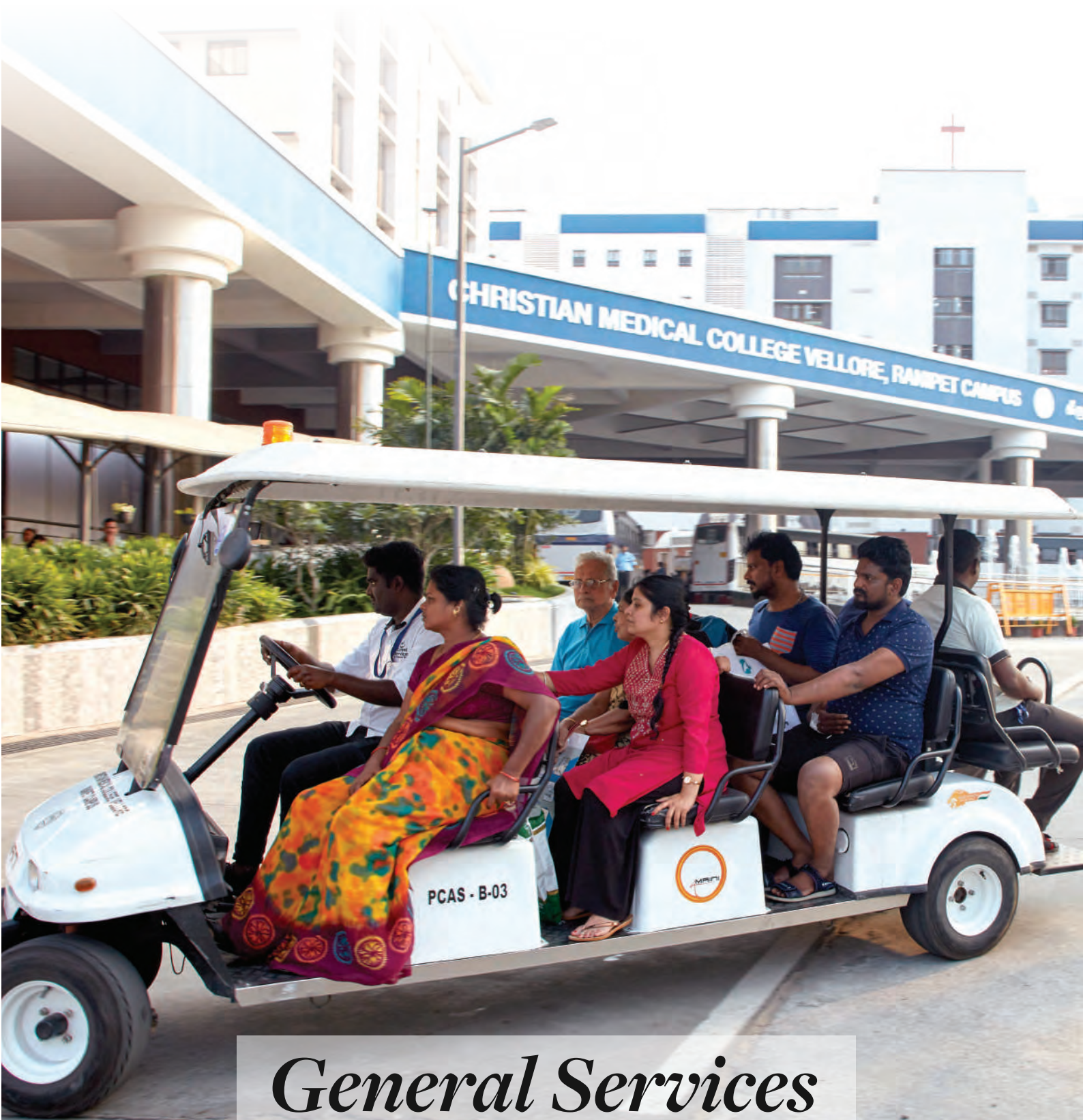

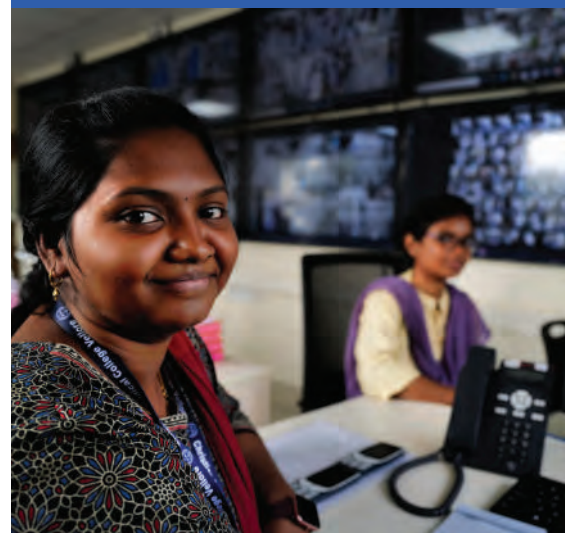

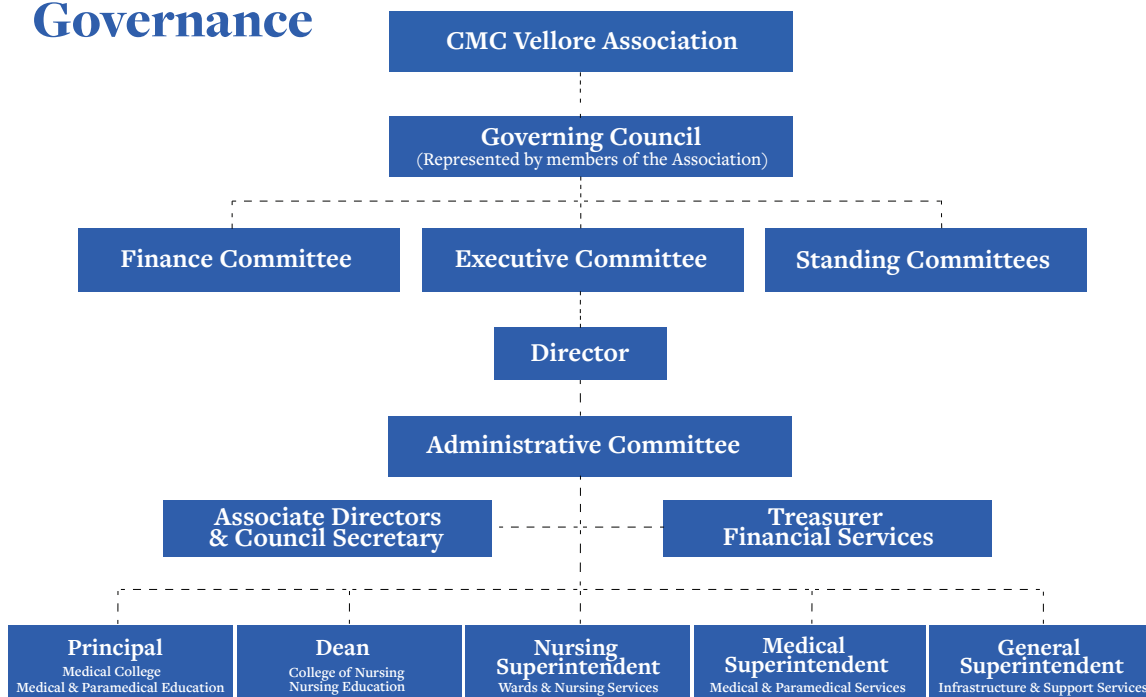
Central Command Centre (CCC)



The CCC coordinates emergency responses, including fire incidents, floods, mob violence, strokes, CART, polytrauma, and Code Pink (one of the many codes they conduct). Response team activation follows standardised protocols developed by the Quality Management and Safety Cell. Mock drills are conducted to ensure protocol adherence and emergency effectiveness. Additionally, the team manages safety-related incidents like lift malfunctions and addresses general inquiries within the institution.

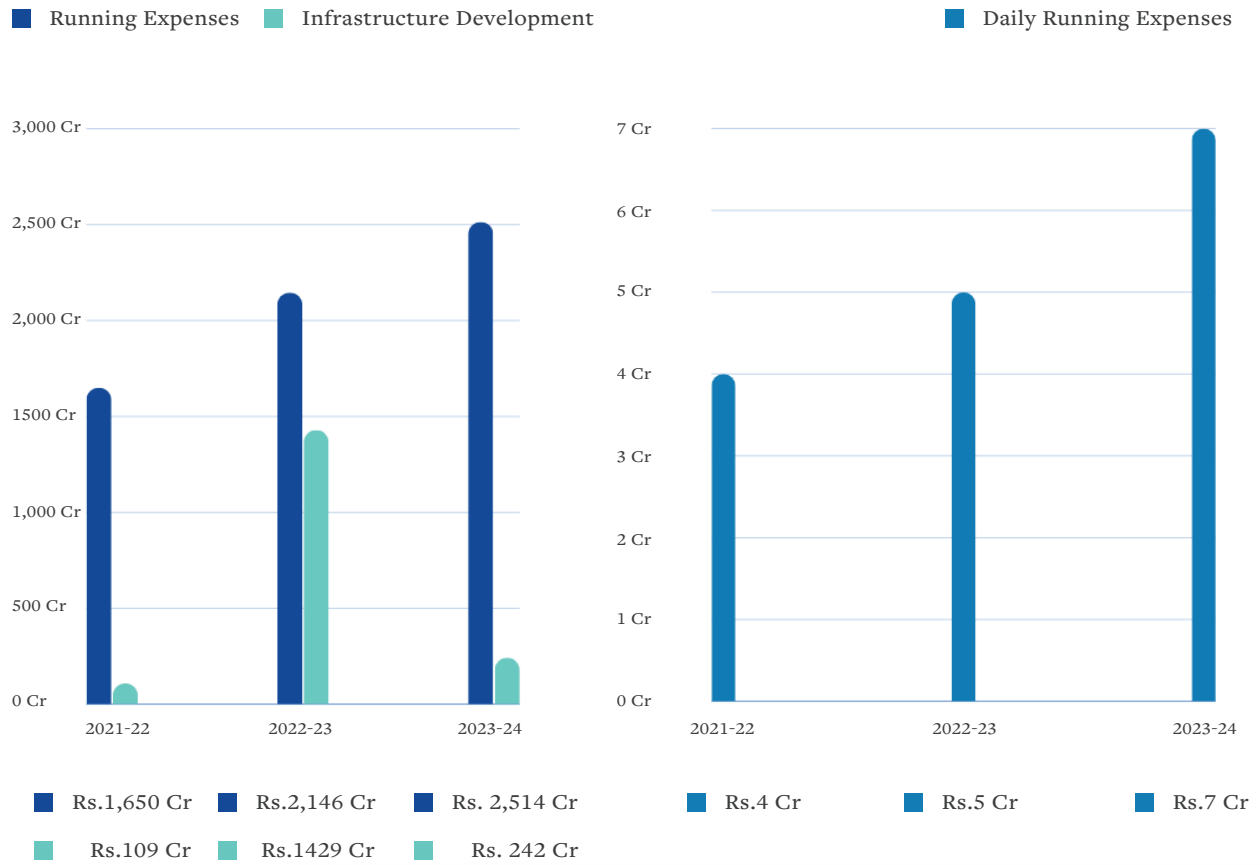

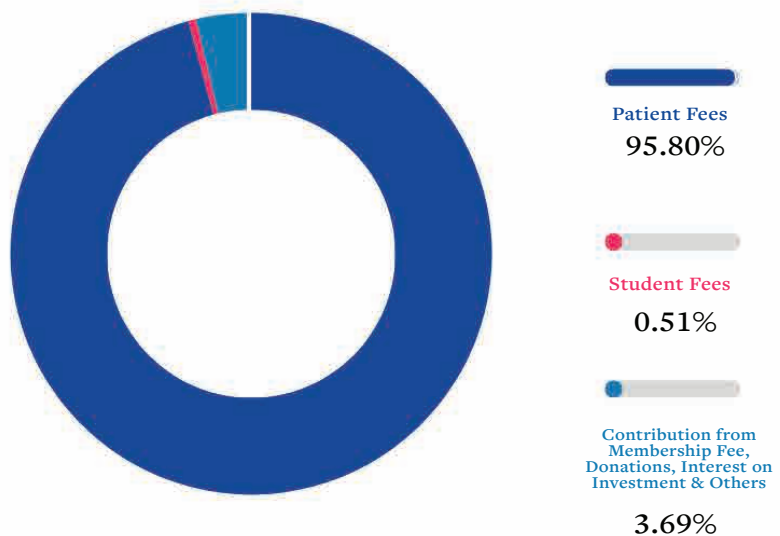

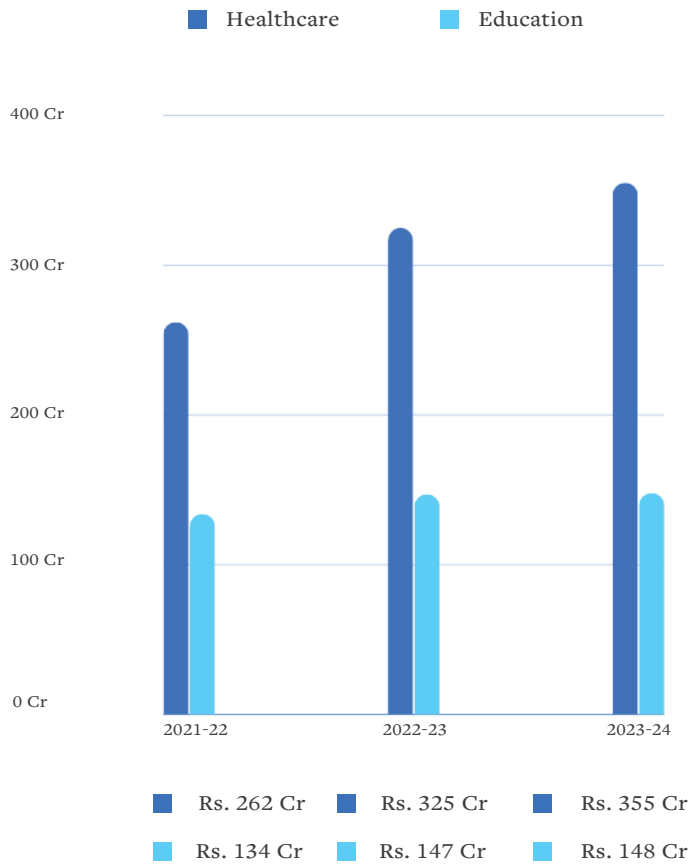
ICRA, a trusted and professional Credit Rating Agency, has given CMC Vellore a Double-A rating for the financial year 2023-2024.

In 2023-2024, 95.80% of CMC Vellore’s revenue came from patient care services, 0.51% from student fees and 3.69% from contributions.



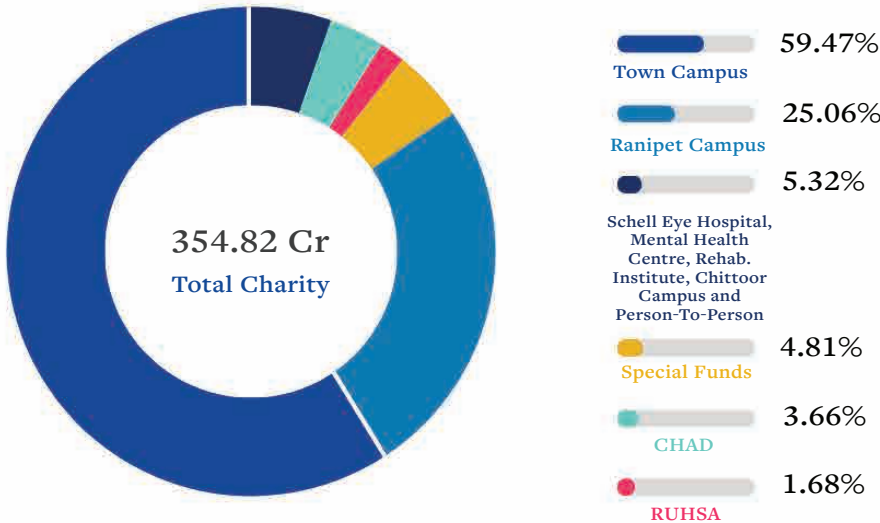

Raaga's healing notes



Raaga's stomach throbbed painfully, and she couldn't stop vomiting. For this young mother of two sons, who is accustomed to physical labour, it said something loud and clear : she is sick. Her worried husband rushed her to CHAD hospital, a two-hour drive from where they live, a Tribal village in Jawadhi Hills.

She was treated for acute gastritis. When her pain did not subside, the doctors immediately referred her to the Department of General Medicine, Town campus. Raaga was admitted and diagnosed with an infection in her kidney and Systemic Lupus Erythematosus (SLE), an auto-immune disease. After more than ten days of treatment, Raaga began to feel better. She missed seeing her boys and could not wait to get back home to them.

Raaga now religiously attends her follow-up at our CHAD Hospital and never misses a chance to express gratitude to the doctors who helped her recover. For Raaga and her husband, who are daily-wage workers migrating between Kerala and their native place, our concession marks a lifeline.

Person-To-Person Programme

The Person-To-Person (PTP) programme, started in the 1970s, is a unique collaboration between donors, CMC Vellore's medical teams, and patients. PTP provides up to ₹10,000 for one patient. When you give to PTP, CMC matches your gift five times, resulting in a maximum support of ₹50,000 per patient.

Emergency Fund

The Emergency Fund supports operations and procedures for economically disadvantaged patients. This fund runs solely on donations and gifts from friends and well-wishers. Donors generously give between ₹2,000 and ₹2 lakh for poor patient care. We allocate a grant of ₹60,000 to ₹80,000 to subsidise a patient's treatment costs.
